Introduction to East Asia: JAPAN

Course Description:

This course is a general introduction to major themes in Japanese history from ancient times to the present. It begins with Ancient Japan and the development of its Court Society down to the 12th century. It then asks questions about the nature of Japanese feudal society and the dynamics of social change in the age of the samurai from the 12th to the early 19th centuries. The second half of the course treats the emergence of the modern Japanese state and the rise of Japanese militarism and rapid economic development. The course concludes with a brief assessment of the legacies of World War II, the Occupation era, and the Cold War on 1990s Japan.

Formal Course Requirements:

There will be a one-hour in-class examination on February 27, consisting of identification type questions requiring short answers. A second in-class examination, similar in nature, will be held on April 16. The third requirement is a two-hour final examination on May—covering the entire course. The final will consist of essay questions selected from a list distributed beforehand.

The in-class exams will count for 20 percent each of the course grade; participation in class discussion sections will count for 10 percent and the final exam for 50 percent.
