THE MAKING OF MODERN EUROPE, 1500-1815

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course aims at providing students with a broad, comprehensive knowledge of European history from about 1500 to 1815. To this end an effort will be made to keep a balance between the political, economic, intellectual, and social developments in Europe as well as between individual nations. Some events or trends of major significance, however, will inevitably call for greater attention and a somewhat fuller discussion. These include: the Protestant Reformation, the Scientific Revolution, the Enlightenment, and the French Revolution.
