Students enrolled for four credits will be expected to submit a term paper of about 5000 words or ten pages. The paper must be on an approved topic, be based on four or more scholarly sources (where articles are used, figure three articles = one book), and be supplied with citations and bibliography.

Four credit students should be enrolled in four credit sections, where regular attention will be given to topic selection, bibliography, research methods, writing strategies, and citation procedures. The recitation grade in these sections will include punctual and complete fulfillment of the steps below:

Registration of your title and topic: 22 February

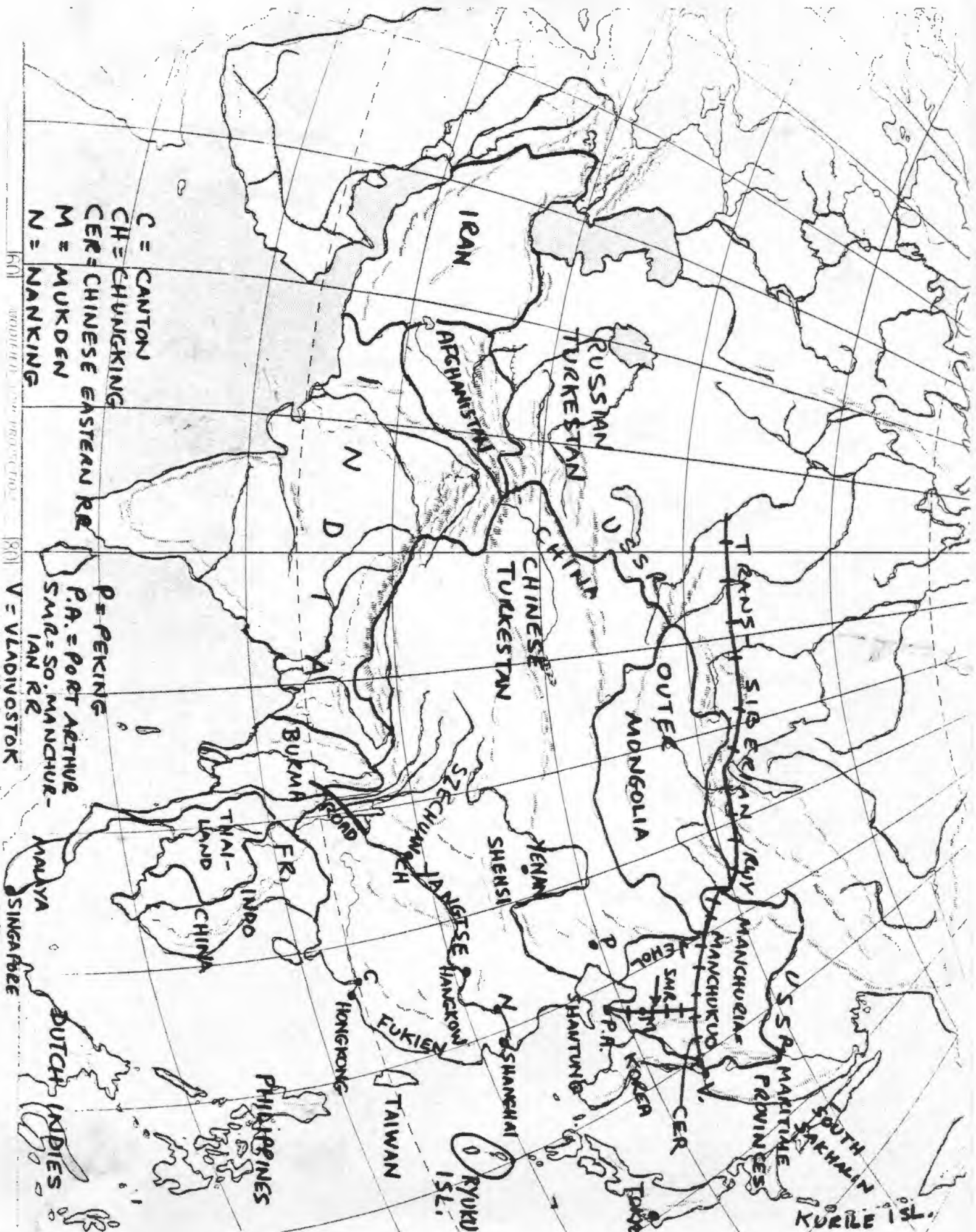
Listing of four sources in your possession: 22 March

Summary or outline of your paper: 19 April

Turn in final draft: 5 May\*

\* deductions thereafter until date of final exam. No papers accepted after final exam.
