## WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS and EXAMINATIONS

There will be a mid-term and a final examination required of all students. Both examinations will consist of essay questions and will be in-class examinations. Those students enrolled in the class for 3 credits will write one critical essay-review (format to be given in class) comparing at least two books on a subject to be agreed upon between the student and the instructor. Those enrolled for 4 credits will write a short (10-15 pages) research paper on a topic to be agreed upon between

the student and the instructor. Students will present first drafts of their work, receive comment from the instructor, and present the final draft by the last day of the course.
