## Topics in Jewish History: Jews and Judaism in the Modern World

This course seeks to examine the shaping of the modern Jewish experience in response to the challenges of modernity. We will focus primarily on one hundred and fifty years of European Jewish history, from the mid-eighteenth century to the turn of the twentieth century, in order to study the foundations of religious, intellectual, and social trends characteristic of modern Judaism. Through careful reading of primary sources in translation, students will be introduced to seminal thinkers and writings of this period. Seminar discussion will aim at providing the conceptual framework by which to address the continuities and discontinuities of Jewish life in the modern age.
